Doug will work with MAMI to contact past donors to ensure their wishes are respected. 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### Living through Transition at the Qu'Appelle House of Prayer ~ Submitted by Fr. Glenn Zimmer and Sr. Margaret Dick, SNJM

The departure of Catherine and Rick from the Qu'Appelle House of Prayer, after about 20 years of involvement including close to four years of living at QHP, has occasioned a unique opportunity, as well as need, to discern a thorough, open-minded review of QHP and its next 3-5 years. Other realities of life support this revisioning: our own declining energies; increased requests for stays at the house; need for property upgrades; and more "pastoral" requests than ever coming from outside the house.

A discernment is underway with a variety of committed and knowledgeable partners; among these are some of the guests who have come here for many years; current volunteers and others asking for more participation in the life and work of QHP; the Lacombe Province leadership; and Associate and Oblate members of the Saskatchewan District Community.

Volunteers and benefactors always have been and are vital to the existence of the house. During these months there continue to be several who help out for a few hours, even for a few days. From the beginning of May until the end of June, six live-in volunteers will be here, usually two or three at a time. Plans are underway for the remaining summer and autumn months to assure both community life and work. Although deliberately somewhat fewer in number for the time being, several guests continue to come for personal time under a variety of arrangements. This, both groups and individuals, includes anything from a full house during the Triduum and Easter to a 3-month resident on a sabbatical.

The past weekend, March 16-18, has been a positive example (and helpful learning) of alternative possibilities for the house of prayer. Five teenagers from the local Anglican church, with their pastor and one parent, spent the entire weekend (Friday afternoon to Sunday morning) on retreat, much of it in silence. Participants took the lead for meal preparation,

with the two of us in a support role. It was a very positive experience in every way, and also stretched our imaginations for future possibilities. The youth, all part of a two-year Discipleship Formation program, have asked for two more weekends at the house of prayer.

A weekend of visioning and planning will take place in late May; a variety of persons from different backgrounds and experiences will contribute to revisiting the original Vision and Mission statement, the implementation of this for the next 3-5 years and the clarifying of what wider co-responsibility for the house might practically look like – and why.

That being said, after nearly 23 years, there are more uncertainties than certainties, there are more things not in our power than in our control and best intentions. We walk by faith and do the best we can day by day.

As always, we count on the questions, suggestions, concerns and participation especially from the Oblate Associates and vowed Oblates in OMI Lacombe Province.

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#### The Way of the Cross through the Voice of Victims ~ Submitted by Fr. Glenn Zimmer

"A special welcome to those of you who may have been alienated from the church, who have been wounded by members of the church or who are victims of clergy sexual abuse... This is not an easy way of the cross to participate in, and is not for the faint of heart... for victims of clergy sexual abuse, a church can be a very painful place... Where love was to be spoken... power was misused ... God's love was not revealed, but hidden." Message of Archbishop Donald Bolen, Archbishop of Regina.

These words welcomed a few people in Our Lady of Sorrows church late Sunday afternoon on Sunday, March 18. Before the beginning of the 14 stations, we were quietly reminded: "We stand broken. All of us." With each station, as we moved around the church, we heard the voices of victims – real victims of clergy sexual abuse, because this way of the cross used the words of actual victims. One was present for the service. After the last station, another woman, Joyce (not her real name), abused by a priest as a young person, turned to me and simply said: "Every one of the words of those victims could be mine."

This unusual way of the cross is taking place throughout the diocese, in every deanery and in some parishes. It is the initiative of Bishop Don.

This morning, about 8:30, the phone rang. It was Joyce. She had two questions: "Did you have your coffee yet?" (Yes!) and "Can I come for coffee with you?"
