#### Words from Sr. Anne Lewans

Dolores Ruschkowski (Lewans) passed away early Sunday, July 8 at the age of 88 years. Dolores was in a care facility at Eastend, SK. She is the older sister to **Fr. Syl Lewans**.

Though Dolores was not in her home town of Shaunavon, she was quite OK with Eastend because it is a newer facility and the rooms were more spacious. In fact, she had a room large enough to accommodate



some of her furniture, including a table, her sewing machine, and supplies for quilting....which she worked at right up to her death. (She made eight quilts while in long term care!)

Dolores had arthritis in various parts of her body, especially in her back. She also had been doctoring at various times for some stomach problems which were related to a hiatus hernia.

Saturday evening Dolores said she was not feeling well and the staff was able to get her stomach settled by early Sunday, but told her they would call an ambulance anyway and have her checked out in Swift Current. They went back to her room a few minutes later and she was gone. So, we don't really know the cause of death. In any case, it has been a big shock for everyone. I saw her just a couple weeks ago and she was in great spirits, able to go out to the local restaurant for lunch....and then later to the home farm for supper. Great memories to have now!

Dolores has nine children who live in various places across western Canada. It has been a challenge for them to communicate easily to discuss funeral arrangements. It is summer time and some people are holidaying.... One son was at the airport when he got the

news...he and his entire family were about to leave on a trip to Germany. (His siblings encouraged him to continue with his plans). So, we will not have a funeral now. Rather it is planned for July  $30^{th}$  in Shaunavon (11 am, I think).

Today I was with Fr. Syl at 10:30 a.m. to pray with him....as there was a prayer service for Dolores in Shaunavon at this time.

There was no Mass at St.Vital's on Monday, therefore twelve of the faithful joined us; among them was Deacon Kendrick. He will be ordained Priest at St. Joseph's Wednesday evening. We have offered our residence to accommodate his guests so all 14 available beds are ready.

Since we do not know many of our neighbors, we planned to host a potluck BBQ July 28<sup>th</sup>, for those living along the old number four highway. The decision was made while Fr. Ed was living here. He was great in sharing the work load. Neighbors have been offering help in preparing for the event which could include close to 50 households. Of those, I expect perhaps 20 families to come judging from the response to date and from the number that attended a similar celebration at a neighbor's two years ago. So life is good.



#### Summer Notes from the Qu'Appelle Valley

The abundance of summer life is evident in so many ways throughout the Qu'Appelle Valley – and that includes the Qu'Appelle House of Prayer.

Some highlights: More than ever in nearly 23 years, volunteers



Chantelle, a Sister of the Presentation of Mary, is immersed in sabbatical time for more than three months with us. Usually there are four or five guests at any given time, always from a wide diversity of backgrounds. Sue, a very gifted artist (who volunteers here a half-day every week), led a two-day retreat last week called "Befriending Wildflowers". The participants included a mother and 11-year-old daughter; a Time was divided between very first for us. personal sharing, times of prayer in the Chapel, our several walking trails, and seeing



wildflowers close up (as much with the heart as with the eyes). The participants did water color paintings of what was seen.

Each guest who comes here has a unique personal story that becomes part of time here. One

such will be ordained a woman Bishop this Saturday as part of the Roman Catholic Women Priests (Canada) movement that began on the Danube River in 2002. Another is dealing with transitioning from one gender to another. And yet another is a renowned Orthodox writer, preparing here yet another major book for publishing in the coming months. family, two mothers and their daughter, spent time with us on their way to Indonesia. Most are people who have come here many times over the years, usually arriving somewhat changed and deepened since their last visit. These long-term relationships are particularly soulful and that is primary: relationship. In a few days, five young people. calling themselves Christian Filmmakers, doing a five-day shoot in this area on nearby First Nations' lands, will stay with us. In a word, our once-a-day And on it goes. conversational suppers are never Everyone who comes here in some way seasons who we are and our lives, the effect which lasts long after the guest has left.

Much work, reflecting and discussion continues among about 15 persons or so about the future of the House of Prayer. A very engaging and inspired Visioning Weekend took place late May. Following more work over the summer, the hope is to meet again this October or November to move forward with proposals for the House of Prayer for the next 3-5 years.

Pastoral involvement with local people, many of whom have adopted this ministry and ourselves, continues. During the past six days, we assisted two funerals in the historic Oblate church in Lebret, and one graveside memorial in the 100year-old country cemetery south of Dysart and wedding plans are well underway for two couples. A little one-year old is being baptized here next week on his birthday; his birth story is nothing short of a miracle (as every birth is some more so). At the same celebration, his eightvear-old sister will receive her first communion, having been baptized in the chapel here two years ago. Part of this afternoon was with a 102year-old wonderful woman from the local Anglican parish; it is expected that she will die today.

The garden and raspberry patch are lush – thanks to planters Boyd, Karen, Dave and Rose, and countless hours of picking, weeding, watering and enjoying by many!

### Summer Stillness 2018 at Queen's House with Fr. Ron Rolheiser OMI

For the last 30 years, Ron Rolheiser has been presenting at Queen's House as a center piece to Summer

Stillness. Of course, this year has been no exception, except to say that the community that gathers to hear Ron and to be with each other is approaching our capacity here at Queen's House. This is a wonderful challenge that we are grateful to have to face!

Ron began this event with a Public Presentation entitled Rising Up: From Living by Goodwill and Dogged Willpower to Drawing upon the Resurrection and Grace. We hosted 175 participants for this presentation and 145 of them joined us for supper as well. The added bonus of

this gathering is that many of our guests know each other and have become something of a community, so there is no shortage of energy and enthusiasm in this mix. During this talk, Ron led us through the insights that help us understand the challenges that we face as we live our lives in good and generative ways. Coming to understand the issues is a necessary first step as we learn that "Only God raises anything from the dead. We rise up only by grace." Next, Ron reminded us that grace can be described as "living as God's beloved"; a concept that resonated with all participants, even as we understand and accept that there is a struggle for grace that is real. Ron instructed us of this by exploring Jesus' examples through the humble plea of "Lord, teach us to pray" and the struggle for grace, the need for grace, and the source of grace in his "test" in the Garden of Gethsemane. Ron then reminded us that there is Consolation of living in Grace, that we don't have to get it "right" or attain perfection and that we can "risk the gospel", knowing that being with the "Bread of Life" we will always have enough and that we never have reason to lose hope. So

We are invited to rise up to the challenge to receive grace!

Ron then continued on Tuesday morning with the presentation entitled **Insane for the Light: Spirituality for our Wisdom Years** by situating our wisdom years anthropologically and spiritually and by stressing that one size doesn't fit all as we accept Jesus' invitations in the Gospels by challenging us at different stages of our lives. We struggle; to get our lives together, to give our lives for others, and to give our deaths away. But there is more depth to be found in later generativity, the Wisdom Years - the Generativity of Mentoring and Blessing and an inchoate nagging beneath the surface that

beckons us. Ron continued the insight outlining aging as The Intent of God and Nature or Wisdom by Conscription.

Next, Ron shared about Moving toward Wisdom as the psychological and spiritual challenges of late generativity – processes of moving towards rather that fading away where fruitfulness replaces achievement as gratitude, forgiveness, faith. hope, childlikeness, surrender. contemplation, community, fidelity and a moreconscious sense of the "Prodigal, Loving God we live under". Ron continued by illustrating that the ultimate task within our wisdom years is blessing others. This leads us to the invitation of giving our deaths away as our last greatest gift, a natural continuum of discipleship, and the mystery of leaving spirit behind.

Finally, Ron shared insights regarding Life

within the Communion of Saints as still connected and still giving. Ron concluded with insights and reflections regarding death; our beliefs, our understandings, reported experiences, heaven, hell and purgatory, our fears, suicide, on a happy death and other questions and insights that participants shared.

This was a remarkable couple of days that Queen's House and our community have been graced with. Thanks Ron for giving your life away to those of us fortunate enough to have been able to attend.
