Introducing Jane Brennan

I sat down recently to talk with Jane Brennan, our new Ontario District Administrator and Administrator of Springhurst Residence. I began with three questions that I hoped would tell us a little bit more of who Jane is.

How would you describe yourself as a person? "I am a spiritual person" she said, "open to other peoples, other life styles and other religions". "They are the greatest things in my life and this continues on in my grandchildren." Two daughters and one son who have given her six grandchildren that are between the ages of 4 and 19 years old.

Jane is a very family centered person and as we talked I noticed that she opens herself to include others into her heart's family. During her time as working as the local Director of the Children's Wish Foundation, taught her how she worked things with and in her heart rather than just her head. This interview was not about the list of jobs she has done but rather who she is as a person.

As I left Jane to return home to write this brief introduction about her I was reminded of St. Eugene's words about leading us to be human, then Christian and finally helping each other to become saints. ...The conclusion to be drawn from this... is: we must work, with renewed ardour and still more total devotedness, to bring to God all the glory that stems from our efforts and, to the needy souls of our neighbours, salvation in all possible ways; we must attach ourselves heart and soul to our Rules and practice [more] exactly what they prescribe to us...

... In the name of God, let us be saints. (Letter to the Oblates, 18 February 1826, EO VII, n. 226)

We are reminded of the words our Superior General, Father Louis Lougen OMI, wrote to us in his letter celebrating February 17, last year. "It seemed to me that what I saw, what I could put my finger on, was that within her lies hidden the germ of very great virtues, and that she can achieve infinite good; I found her worthy, everything pleased me about her, I cherished her rules, her statutes; her ministry seemed sublime to me, as it is indeed. I found in her bosom sure means of salvation, even infallible, such is how they looked to me" (Selected Texts p. 119).
