## **Dear Oblate Family!**

### Life with the Oblates at Foyer Lacombe (by Fr. Alfred Groleau, OMI)

As Easter approaches, we are joyful, eight of us trying to ground our hope in patience and prayer. We have gained security against covid with our first vaccine this month and we await our second in April. Each one contributes in his own way to the little shores required of us since we no longer have our meals in Covenant Care cafeteria, but our meals are brought to us. The monotony of a cafeteria diet has been alleviated since generous Oblate Associates have brought us a meal each week – thanks especially to Joanne & Dan Friedt, and to Doug & Faith Paul. Gerry LeStrat is our newest member and he also has displayed his culinary skills. Health wise, our men are OK. Alfred Hubenig maintains a constant flow of communication by telephone and wireless connections even as he is approaching 90.

We also have three men living in long term care homes. Louis-Philippe Roy, at Youville Home near to us on Mission Hill since June 2020, is enjoying good health and an active social life. Jerome Blackburn has lived at St. Albert Seniors' Home in north St. Albert since about five years; he has overcome the covid while the home had an outbreak of over 50 cases with some deaths, and his dementia impairs his communication. Gilles Gauthier has lived now a full year in Villeneuve, ten kilometers west of St. Albert, at West Country Hearth; he is in good shape physically, but also demented and living in his own present, probably brought on by his injury when he was in Bangladesh.



We are still an active and alert community though seven of us have entered into the 80's bracket and Maurice Joly will soon be 92. Some of us remain active physically: Wladek Karciarz continually prompting us into skiing expeditions, and with Don Claerhout & Ed McSheffrey seeking daily maintenance tasks. We remain very conscious of our link with brother oblates and with the Church through our prayer. We are also very committed to the synodal process launched by our Provincial Administration.
