#### **Growing Hope at Galilee**

Galilee is expanding its community gardens. With the help of a grant from Renfrew County Community Services, six new plots are being added this year for the use of marginalized individuals and families referred by caring community members or sponsors. The initiative by Galilee's Board of Directors was communicated to the Greater Arnprior Council on Poverty and Homelessness. Invitations to the Arnprior Food Bank and L'Arche communities will follow. The goal is to promote physical exercise, wellbeing, food security and community engagement. Participants will be guided by experienced volunteer gardeners in the growing of their own produce and flowers.

The existing gardens at Galilee are full and there is often a waiting list. These new plots include raised beds constructed by the Arnprior Men's Shed as well as ground level ones. This initiative, brought forward by Karen Ann McKinna, Oblate Associate was given flesh by Richard Kelly, OMI nourished by Gerry Kelly and executed with the help of others by Alan Budarick and David Morgan, Oblate Associate.

Just as we gathered to celebrate the ground breaking, rain poured down as though it were a baptism by aspersion (sprinkling), wrote Metroland reporter <a href="Derek Dunn">Derek Dunn</a>. It is expected that the Galilee OMI Hope Garden will be available in June with an official opening ceremony to follow. All supplies, seeds, plants and tools will be provided by Galilee. In the spirit of St. Eugene, we seek to grow hope for the marginalized at Galilee.



We share with you this prayer written by Darcie Lich, an Oblate Associate.

Creator God of love and justice, comforter of those who mourn, we turn to you acknowledging the actions of our Church and our nation. We have asked forgiveness and committed to work for healing and reconciliation. But we are painfully aware that for some, that change came too late.

We offer you our sorrow for the wrongs committed against the people of this land, our First Nations, Inuit, and Métis children in Canada's Indian Residential Schools.

We offer you our contrition for what was allowed to happen, and for what will never be.

We offer you our repentance for the injustices borne of arrogance and the harm done through indifference.

We pray for comfort for the families and communities whose children, siblings, family, and friends were taken from home but did not return.

We pray for consolation of hearts wounded through separation and trauma.

We pray for healing of bodies, minds, and spirits wounded through abuse and oppression.

We ask for clear eyes, that we may face the story of our nation and our Church with honesty.

We ask for open hearts, that we may hear the stories of Indigenous Peoples with humility.

We ask for courage, that we may once again ask our brothers and sisters for forgiveness.

We declare our desire to be a people who pursue peace.

We declare our resolve to be a people who remember.

We declare our commitment to be a people of truth and reconciliation.

Holy One, Creator of all that is, seen and unseen, of story and of song, of heartbeat and of tears, of bodies, souls, voices and all relations: you are the God of all truth and the way of all reconciliation. Come upon us, O Divine Healer, and open our eyes to the injustices brought against the Indigenous peoples of this land, their languages and cultures. May you be known for healing and wholeness, rather than being blamed for abuses that were brought about by human weakness and hostility. Make us people of integrity and bearers of hope, that we may commit to restoring relationships and to journeying together, as Non-Indigenous and Indigenous brothers and sisters, to a place of peace in you, where every tear will be wiped away, and every sorrow turned to joy. Give us one heart and one mind to walk together in the love and strength of your Spirit, in truth, reconciliation, and peace.

We ask this through Jesus Christ, your Son, our brother, our Lord, and our hope.

## Mazenodian Family ORAISON - June 20, 2021

In prolonged silent prayer [...], we let ourselves be modeled by the Lord, and find in him the inspiration of our conduct" (OMI Rule of Life, 33). The practice of Oraison was an important part of St. Eugene's daily prayer during which entered into communion with the members of his missionary family. In this spirit let us become aware that we are praying in communion with the love of Christ the Saviour.


**FOCUS**: The month of June traditionally celebrates the Sacred Heart of Jesus. St. Eugene de Mazenod had a deep devotion to the Sacred Heart and encourage his missionary family to spread this devotion which reveals the love of Christ the Saviour.

**WORD OF GOD**: Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give your rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light. (Matthew 11;28-30)

OBLATE TEXT: Eugene wrote to his mother; "To give honor to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is to drink in the love of God at its very fountainhead". In the seminary, he expressed it as "the feast of Jesus Christ's love for man". As a result, he wishes to love others with the intensity of the love of Christ. As for himself, he wants "to be a priest according to his Heart, for everything is contained in that one word". As he states in his diary, the Heart of Jesus is "the prototype for our hearts". We should deepen our understanding of everything that flows from the loving heart of Jesus Christ, not only for all people, but in particular for his apostles and disciples". PRAYER: O God, what will You do to conquer the fearful hardness of our hearts? Lord, You must give us new hearts, tender hearts, sensitive hearts, to replace hearts that are made of marble and of bronze. You must give us Your own Heart, Jesus. Come, lovable Heart of Jesus. Place Your Heart deep in the centre of our hearts and enkindle in each heart a flame of love as strong, as great, as the sum of all the reasons that I have for love You, my God. O holy Heart of Jesus, dwell hidden in my heart, so that I may live only in You and only for You, so that, in the end, I may live with You eternally in heaven, Amen (St. Claude de la Colombiere)





# THE DEAD SEA SCROLLS AND PSALM 51: SCRIPTURE STUDY ON ZOOM – JUNE 24, 2021

**Facilitator:** Lynn Mills **Date:** Thursday June 24, 2021, **Time:** 11:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. EDT (9:30 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. CST/MDT)

This workshop, which will be led by Lynn Mills live on Zoom from Dublin Ireland, will take a close look at Psalm 51 (often called the psalm of psalms), identifying key elements and themes such as repentance, cleansing, and transformation before exploring how these themes are picked up and repeated in the texts of the Dead Sea Scrolls. Although perhaps not as entertaining as Raiders of the Lost Ark, the discovery of 2000-year-old scrolls in hidden caves in the desert of Palestine in 1947 is one of the most important archaeological finds of the last century. These manuscripts were hidden in a time of war and they were found 1900 years later in a time of war. This will be a hands-on experience -please have coloured pencils, pens or highlighters at hand (min 4-8 colours) to assist you in participating in this workshop.

#### PRAYER IS TO BE SHARED

Much that has been said about prayer might create the false impression that prayer is a private, individualistic, and nearly secret affair, so personal and so deeply hidden in our inner life that it can hardly be talked about, even less be shared. The opposite is true. Just because prayer is so personal and arises from the center of our life, it is to be shared with others. Just because prayer is the most precious expression of being human, it needs the constant support and protection of the community to grow and flower. Just because prayer is our highest vocation, needing careful attention and faithful perseverance, we cannot allow it to be a private affair. Just because prayer asks for a patient waiting in expectation, it should never become the most individualistic expression of the most individualistic emotion, but should always remain embedded in the life of the community of which we are part.

"Again, I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about anything you ask for, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three come together in my name, there I am with them." *Matthew 18:19, 20*
