In all, I was just so much touched by the way the Mission has grown and also the number of young Oblates who are in the mission. We came back to Canada somewhat over tired but filled with Gods blessings for the mission in Kenya.

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## Reflections on Convocation 2022

## Communion-Participation-Mission

On May 30th, the Oblates of OMI Lacombe Canada gathered in St. Albert to begin their 2022 Convocation. The gathering of approximately eighty people was made up of vowed Oblates, Associates and invited guests.

We have attended three convocations over our term as Associate Advisors on SDC and would like to share some of what we perceive to be the high lights of this gathering.

Firstly, was the joy, excitement and gratitude of being able to have this gathering in person. Meeting old friends and making new ones was a real highlight. With so many of our gatherings being virtual due to COVID it was such a blessing to be together in person, something that we took for granted and didn't recognize as precious until it was gone.

The planning and the preparation of the delegates helped make this convocation unique. The group facilitators were well prepared and knew their duties and responsibilities. The group process for sharing and reporting was clearly defined and provided consistency to both the sharing and reporting in the groups. From our experience there seemed to be an atmosphere of cooperation and engagement among the group.

The fact that there were no keynote speakers made this convocation unique. All of the input came from the participants. The schedule allowed ample time for breaks and time for prayer and individual discernment.

The sharing questions began with looking at what we desired from this Convocation, significant moments in our OMI Lacombe journey, and the graced history of the Oblates in Canada. Then we went on to looking at the sinful patterns or ruts that prevent us from being faithful to our Oblate identity and concluded with what we as a Province are being called to in this time and place and concrete actions to accomplish this.

Throughout the group reports, the key undercurrent was the need to walk together on a journey of healing with our Indigenous brothers and sisters. This message came through loud and clear and seemed to be setting a direction OMI Lacombe Province.

Finally, one of the invaluable gifts of the Convocation was the presence of invited guests Harry and Germaine Lafond from Muskeg Lake Cree Nation. Harry responded to the group reports and in so doing talked about how to build bridges of healing between our two cultures. Harry shared his story of growing up and how he re-immersed himself in the Cree language and culture. He also shared how the Oblates of OMI Lacombe Canada and the Indigenous people of Muskeg Lake had many similar dreams and hopes and how they could use these as stepping stones toward healing. His message was positive and uplifting. His message centered not on trying to build on failure, but to look for your gift, build on the positive things and the importance of finding your spirit.

Unfortunately, the presence of COVID 19 made itself known on the last day of the Convocation. It meant that we, Adele and Jim, missed the last day as we were sequestered in our room. Subsequently several attendees tested positive for the virus.

Fortunately, we have not heard of anyone getting severely ill.

Consequently, we felt like we were left hanging. Like we were in the middle of a good movie and the power went off just before the end. However, the value of what we did experience left a positive impression and we are eagerly awaiting the final report from the administration and the directions for moving forward as a Province.



#### Greetings Folks:

On Thursday, June 23 an early morning text alerted me to the fact that our Church Building at Our Lady of the Smile, Waterhen Lake, SK was set on fire and subsequently burned to the ground. No one was

physically hurt but we, all of us, are hurting in various ways. The people who have gathered in this building since 1954 and celebrated all the various faith moments of life and death are deeply touched and are grieving and giving thanks as they share memories.

The fire is under investigation and at this time there is no clear motivation for it. The people feel violated that this has happened in their community. They are struggling with all sorts of feelings including anger, frustration, hurt, sadness, loss, and resentment and they are praying for the person/persons who have done this. Their thought is that only someone who is really suffering could do such a terrible thing to their brothers and sisters.

Prior to the fire, we had planned a day of Prayer and Healing for Monday, June 27. While hosted by Our Lady of the Smile parish, Indigenous and Metis Peoples from the area were invited to come and join us. This day was a result of our listening to the community in the Synod process. It was our plan to invite Bishop Stephen Hero, Emeritus Bishop Albert Thevenot, M. Afr., and Emeritus Archbishop, Sylvain Lavoie, OMI (former pastor of Our Lady of the Smile) to join me and Fr. Kendrick Beler (Goodsoil) for a day of prayer, ritual, listening, conversations, presence and if needed and wanted, celebration of the sacraments of reconciliation and/or anointing of the sick. A number of Indigenous rituals were included in the day along with traditional Catholic rituals and prayers like the rosary and litany of the Blessed Mother, and Scripture readings. We had prepared food and music as well. This day will now be postponed until August or early September depending on when we can welcome the Bishops.

Last night a small group of us gathered for a meal and some conversation and to plan the coming days. Now we will do what needs to be done when such an event happens and there is much to do. On July 3, we will gather for mass and a meal and we will talk about what we need to do as a community to heal from

this wound. There is a deep sadness among us. This Sunday, after our liturgies I will go to the site and spend some time there in prayer. At present we are praying for one another and we are praying for the person/persons who did this. We welcome your prayers for us as we remember that God is with us always until the end of time. We are much in need of grace!
