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ORCIE Joins the Jubilee 2025 Campaign!

We are mobilizing a worldwide ecumenical movement advocating for systemic change to address global economic inequality and the burden of unjust debt. Join us in the **Jubilee 2025** *Turn Debt Into Hope* campaign and be part of a global movement for change.

To bring this international campaign to life in Canada, ORCIE has been working with KAIROS, who is leading the campaign in collaboration with Citizens for Public Justice and Development and Peace – Caritas Canada. The Canadian Council of Churches has been active in developing the campaign and will be inviting its member churches to support it.

Thanks to work with ecumenical partners and debt networks worldwide we have a global petition campaign aiming for **10 million signatures** pushing for financial reform and the urgent cancellation of unfair global debt. Throughout 2025 we will use the petition for advocacy initiatives at strategic moments like the upcoming G7 and G20 meetings, as well as COP30.



Another heartfelt appeal I would make is directed to the more affluent nations. I ask that they acknowledge the gravity of so many of their past decisions and determine to forgive the debts of countries that will never be able to repay them."

Why now?

The Jubilee 2000 campaign is often remembered as one of the most successful ecumenical campaigns in Canada, achieving bilateral debt cancellation and contributing to a global campaign that has canceled \$130 billion of debt in 36 countries. The Jubilee year of 2025 brings a renewed opportunity for reflection and action. Today, many countries are spending more money on debt repayments than on healthcare, education or climate action. It is a life and death situation.

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Ecological Debt

Calling for financial reform and the urgent cancellation of unfair global debt is only part of the equation. Wealthy countries, including Canada, and corporations exploit resources from heavily indebted countries and from Indigenous communities causing human rights violations and severe ecological harm. This creates an "ecological debt" owed to those countries and to Indigenous peoples.

Together, we can turn debt into hope!


More than 3.3 billion people live in countries that are spending more on debt payments than on health or education, standing in the way of sustainable development. For heavily indebted countries, public debt has grown so large that repayment is impossible, burdening future generations. This can change.

Public, private and multilateral creditors must cancel or reduce debts, and political leaders must support a multilateral framework for debt resolution. This would be a transformative shift for billions of people, moving us from a model focused on profit and enriching creditors to one that prioritizes a just society, centering people and the planet.

Webinar Recap: From Ecological Debt to Ecological Hope

On March 18th, ORCIE hosted an engaging webinar titled **From Ecological Debt to Ecological Hope**, part of our ongoing engagement in the Jubilee 2025 campaign, "Turn Debt into Hope." With 136 registered participants, the event brought together religious leaders from Canada and Brazil to address the urgent need for ecological and financial justice in the Global South.

The webinar's primary intention was to highlight the burden of unjust, unpayable debts faced by many countries and to discuss **how religious communities can amplify their voices within the Jubilee campaign**, especially that of religious in the Global South. The session featured guest speakers from diverse backgrounds:

- Elton Bozzetto, Brazilian journalist
- Sr. Nilva Dal Bello, CSJ Brazil
- Sue Wilson, CSJ Canada
- Sasquia Antúnez Pineda, ORCIE's Advocacy and Communications Officer

The discussions were enriched by interpretation in French, English, and Portuguese.

Key Takeaways:

The speakers shared insights on the urgent need for debt cancellation, with reflections on the Biblical call for social and ecological justice. As Pope Francis stated, "God is the first to forgive debts, as we always ask in the 'Our Father.' The Jubilee calls us to translate this forgiveness into social terms so that no individual, family, or people is crushed by debt." This message was central to the calls to action brought forward during the webinar, including:

- Reigniting the meaning of the Jubilee Year in terms of Biblical social and ecological justice.
- Amplifying the voices of religious and social movements for ecological justice in the Global South.
- Building the ecumenical justice movement in Canada and internationally.
- Gathering 100,000 signatures from Canadians on the Jubilee petition to support debt justice.







Webinar Recap: From Ecological Debt to Ecological Hope

During the small group discussions, participants reflected on the following questions:

- What resonated with you from the presentations?
- What ideas do you have for engaging your community in the Jubilee campaign?
- How can we share the need for debt cancellation from the perspective of members of religious congregations living in the Global South?

These discussions were an opportunity for attendees to connect, share insights, and further strengthen the call for justice.

The event marked an important step in building momentum for the Jubilee 2025 campaign and its call for ecological hope. As ORCIE continues to advocate for a just and sustainable future, we look forward to working together with all involved to make a tangible impact.



Webinar Recap: From Ecological Debt to Ecological Hope

Darelene O'Leary, sharing her experience from the webinar:

What stood out to you?



It was so important to hear the speakers from Brazil remind us about the impacts of financial and ecological debt on communities. The injustice is so clear when you hear about toxins in women's and babies' bodies as some of the direct impacts of these destructive systems of domination. Hearing from Sr. Nilva really spoke to the power that religious congregations have as witnesses and as strong voices for justice and solidarity.

How do we move forward from here?

I was struck by what I heard in our small group conversations that really said to me that religious congregations in Canada are still in the struggle for justice, peace, and living in interconnectedness with creation, in spite of the slow progress being made over the years. I think there is a unique shared voice that is powerful and that we have a chance to amplify.

The ORCIE webinar felt like a continuation of the efforts of the Sisters of St. Martha, Antigonish, in their long-time advocacy for regulation and oversight of extractive industries. I'll continue to work with the Marthas on local and global efforts for accountability and industry regulation, particularly in light of Canada's commitment to Indigenous rights and sovereignty.







ORCIE Presents Position Paper and Gathers Support for Jubilee 2025 Petition at St. Paul University Eco-Fair

On March 25th and 26th, **ORCIE participated in the St. Paul University's Eco Week**, with inspiring events that brought together students, faculty, and organizations committed to sustainability. The week began with an ORCIE sponsored event - a screening of Princess Mononoke, followed by a thought-provoking panel discussion that drew connections between the film's themes and today's ecological and socio-political challenges.

ORCIE's Executive Director, Genevieve Gallant, and Advocacy and Communications Officer, Sasquia Antúnez Pineda, collaborated with Le Centre Oblate's Executive Director, Tara Hurford, offering support and encouragement to the student organizers. ORCIE was honored to support the fair's success and encourage student leadership.

During the fair, Sasquia represented ORCIE on the panel "Future Leaders of Sustainability:
Organizations Making an Impact", presenting ORCIE's position paper titled "Linking Ecological Debt to Global Financial Exploitation". This presentation highlighted ORCIE's advocacy within the Jubilee 2025 campaign, focused on the topic of ecological debt, and emphasized the urgent need for debt cancellation of low-income countries and ecological justice.

In addition to the panel, ORCIE hosted a booth where attendees were invited to learn more about the <u>Jubilee campaign</u> and sign the petition calling for global financial and ecological debt justice. The event fostered valuable conversations, raising awareness about ORCIE's mission and ongoing advocacy efforts. The fair also offered a valuable opportunity for ORCIE to connect and build relationships with local organizations in Ottawa committed to environmental and peace initiatives.

We are grateful to St. Paul University for hosting this impactful event and to all those who engaged with ORCIE's work. ORCIE celebrates the initiative of SPU students in bringing this event to life, demonstrating their spirit and dedication to sustainability.

Introducing the Jubilee 2025 Project: Amplifying Voices from the Global South

We believe that our advocacy efforts in the Jubilee campaign will be strengthened with first-hand accounts and personal stories by people the most affected by ecological and financial debt in the Global South. In light of this reality, ORCIE is working on preparing an action plan to incorporate narratives and insights from members of religious communities in the Global South into our political advocacy efforts. This will help create momentum within the federal government of Canada to pay our fair share toward adaptation, mitigation, and loss and damage funds in the Global South. Perspectives from the Global South are critical for raising awareness in Canada and generating the political will necessary for a more robust response to climate change.
